Current management scholars have defined authentic leadership as consisting of four dimensions: relational transparency, self-awareness, balanced processing, and internalized moral perspective. This research extends the concept of authentic leadership to include kindness and vulnerability. I created two scales to measure kindness and vulnerability within the context of leadership and used them to examine perceptions of authentic leadership and its impact on three organizational outcomes: trust in one's leader, work engagement, and psychological safety. https://digitalcommons.usf.edu/etd/9093

The fundamental role of healthcare organisations ought to be to care for patients. This article describes how, instead, healthcare has industrialised care; with care degraded, care has become transactional. It has overwhelmed the capacity of both the people called to care and those that receive care, and has rendered care unsustainable. We propose that leaders can restore care by turning their organisations away from industrial healthcare and asserting their organisation's purpose to enact careful and kind care.

Journal of Oncology Practice 2017;13 (11):744-50 (November 2017) The wonders of high-tech cancer care are best complemented by the humanity of high-touch care. Simple kindnesses can help to diffuse negative emotions that are associated with cancer diagnosis and treatment—and may even help to improve patients' outcomes. On the basis of our experience in cancer care and research, we propose six types of kindness in cancer care: deep listening; empathy for the patient with cancer; generous acts of discretionary effort that go beyond what patients and families expect from a care team; timely care; gentle honesty; and support for family caregivers. These mutually reinforcing manifestations of kindness—exhibited by selfaware clinicians who understand that how care is delivered matters—constitute a powerful and practical way to temper the emotional turmoil of cancer for patients, their families, and clinicians themselves.

Kindness creates positive interpersonal connections, which, in turn, buffers stress and fosters resilience. Ways to promote kindness, including leadership modeling positive behaviors as well as the deterrence of negative behaviors, are essential.
